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


INTRODUCTION

The Moon Lane Group has been aware, since Tales on Moon Lane opened 15 years ago, that the UK children's publishing industry has a huge problem with diversity. This lack of representation was confirmed by the Centre for Literacy in Primary Education (CLPE) - in a report funded by the Arts Council England, The rReflecting Realities Report, found that only four percent of all children's books published in the UK in 2017 featured either a Black, Asian or Minority ethnic (BAME) character, Equally damming was the finding that only one percent of children's books published in the UK in 2017 featured a BAME main character against a 33% school age population..[1] [1] (Serroukh, 2018)



These statistics clearly demonstrate the lack of diversity in children's literature in the UK and the moral and statistical need for greater diverse literary representation. Moon Lane believes that the lack of representation in children's literature is limiting aspiration, social integration and social mobility. Driven by the mission of raising equality in children's books. Moon Lane Books has joined forces with local state schools to promote reading for pleasure, primarily with books that reflect the brilliantly multicultural, population of London.



- The 2019 Moon Lane festivals were funded by: The Arts Council, Moon Lane Group, Dulwich Picture Gallery and Beckenham Place Mansion
- The festivals took place across 2 weeks in June 2019
- Children were brought to the festivals by their schools to ensure equal access
- There were 37 events across the festivals
- The Festivals were for the benefit of the London Boroughs of Lewisham and Southwark
- The book festivals were carried out in two locations; The Dulwich Picture Gallery and The Beckenham Place Mansion









pre-author event




Children's attitudes towards reading post-author event


